IT WAS a day out for teachers—a day when they, for a change, became the taught and learnt a few lessons of life. The occasion was the annual PACE Teachers' Seminar where 450 educators from Delhi and the National Capital Region opened their minds to look into a world of opportunities. The seminar, which featured a talk on 'World of Possibilities' by Anand David, dealt with making choices in everyday life. Mr David, a transformational trainer, conducted the talk on looking at possibilities and bringing in a change. He talked on the need for breaking the monotony of routine and looking at the world from a different perspective.

"No breakthrough has ever been achieved in a comfort zone. You have to step out of the trap to make a change and being educators you have to bring a change in you rather than thinking of a change in students," said David who heads the Manford Centre that aims at building an environment conducive for Peace education, Negotiation and Conflict Resolution.

His interactive sessions dealing with curbing the monotony in life evoked a good response from the participating teachers who thoroughly enjoyed the two-hour session.

"There must be a better way" and "I am committed"— the two statements made by Mr David impressed the teachers who felt that seminars like this acted as a motivational tool for them. "We too are stressed out and such workshops are a refreshing change for us," said Vibha Bhalla of Father Agnel Public School, Gautam Nagar.

For others the seminar was a platform that left them thinking about their interaction with students. David who spoke about the need for lateral change

urged educators to move ahead with time and bring in a consciousness amongst students. "Our assumptions are so strong that we rarely look at other possibilities. Besides, developing a divergent thinking approach we need to make a clear-cut distinction between important and urgent work," said David who urged the educators to develop a positive approach to life.
